- Revise your research paper, looking closely at the suggestions I've made. Note: you do NOT have to write out the rules from the code sheet. You'll just make corrections in your paper. Make sure you have a good title and a Works Cited Page.
- 2) Poetry: Read Gerard Manley Hopkins' poem, "Pied Beauty," where he writes in praise of God for things that are pied (having patches of two or more colors). Then consider a characteristic found in nature that pleases you, and write a poem starting "Glory be to God..." or "Praise be to God..." naming and describing the many things you find with that characteristic.

Pied Beauty

Glory be to God for dappled things – For skies of couple-colour as a brinded cow; For rose-moles all in stipple upon trout that swim; Fresh-firecoal chestnut-falls; finches' wings; Landscape plotted and pieced – fold, fallow, and plough; And áll trádes, their gear and tackle and trim.

All things counter, original, spare, strange; Whatever is fickle, freckled (who knows how?) With swift, slow; sweet, sour; adazzle, dim; He fathers-forth whose beauty is past change: Praise him.

Here's an excellent example a student wrote a couple of years ago:

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All things spotty, lined, and straight; Blending in to not be bait (or the other way round, the sand catches *you*)

With smooth, rough; slim, fat; dark and light When looking for beauty, the things that are not seen are better for sight; Praise Him.
